

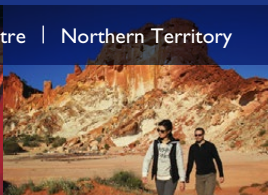

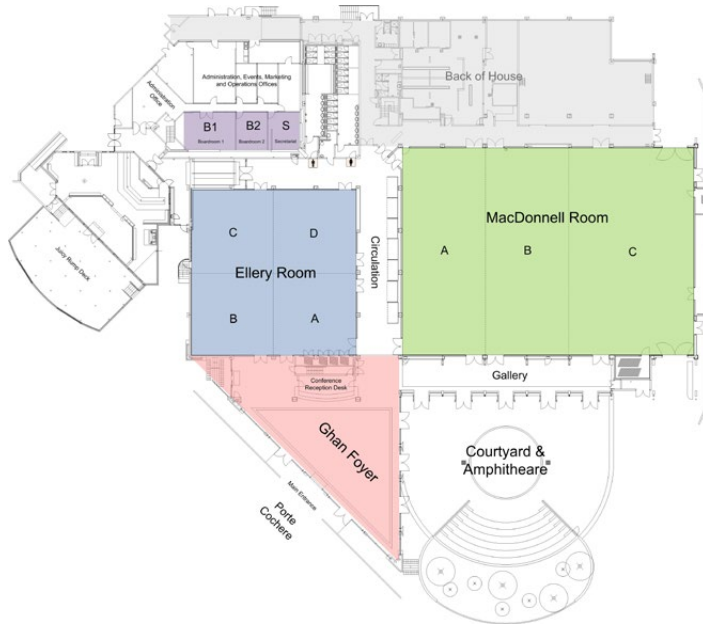
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Expand your Horizons with the Royal Flying Doctor Service @ ICEN 2016!

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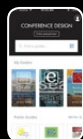
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
